Background


- June 18, 2020: outdoor dining became permitted under County Public Health Order and the City began permitting in-street outdoor dining
 - Flexibility: Program was developed as low-barrier and flexible to enable as many businesses as possible to utilize permitted outdoor dining

Council Direction

- November 2021: Council reviewed and provided preliminary comments for long-term parklet program
 - Support for developing a long-term program
 - Improve safety of parklets
 - Develop clearer standards but maintain some flexibility
 - Manage reduction of parking
 - Require a fee










Surveys

 Staff conducted surveys between December 17, 2021 and January 16, 2022

- Two separate surveys were distributed:
 - Survey 1: To all community members (1,375 responses)
 - Survey 2: To businesses in Albany as well as Berkeley businesses in Albany's section of Solano Avenue (125 responses)


Public Survey: What is your current opinion on a potential permanent parklet program?



General Comments

- The parklets add a nice ambience to the community.
- The parklets reduce available parking.
- The loss of parking is a small price to pay towards having a lively and enjoyable Solano Ave.
- Allocation of the space must be conducted through an open and fair process.
- Charge a fee for use of spaces
- Parklets need to be safer and more solid.

Business Survey: What is your current opinion on a potential permanent parklet program?



General Comments

- Only benefits those that have one.
- Reduces customer parking
- Unfair when businesses only pay for square footage of interior space.
- Support for program with thorough review process.
- Has been helpful for many businesses, and increases activity nearby parklets
- Need to improve safety and construction

Solano Businesses: Opinions on a permanent parklet program



Note:

- 57% of non-restaurants on Solano support a permanent outdoor dining program
- Overall, 59% of Solano businesses support a permanent program

Guideline Development

- January-February: Staff presented an analysis of survey results and existing installations, received initial input on Guidelines
- Feb-April: Staff developed first draft of guidelines
- April-July: Staff presented guidelines and received feedback, multiple rounds of revisions
- Commissions recommend proposed guidelines to Council

Guideline Development

Feedback generally emphasized:

- Improved safety
- Improved access
- Durability of installations and materials
- Balance of different interests in the use of public space

Guideline Elements


- Parklet Location and Setbacks
- Perimeter Barriers
- Platform
- Materials
- Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA)
- Fire

- Maintenance
- Fees and Public Access
- Insurance
- Signage
- Acceptable Use
- Removal and Revocation of Permit



Parklet Location and Setbacks

- Up to 2 parallel or 3 angled spaces
- 3 spaces default to Planning & Zoning
 Commission review
- Only 2 spaces if more than 40% of block utilized by parklets (Economic
 Development Committee)





Perimeter Barriers

- 36-42" wall or railing able to withstand 200 pounds of force required
- Visually permeable above 42"
 permitted with review
- Reflective tape along edges
- Flexible bollard or delineator post at corners









Platform

- Free-standing platform recommended
- Street surface acceptable if can meet ADA
- Modular design preferred
- 6"x6" clear gutter space or equivalent next to curb







Materials


- Perimeter barrier materials of metal, wood, or other natural material
- Planning & Zoning Commission review of alternative materials
- Plant materials and lighting encouraged





Americans with Disabilities Act Access

- Seamless connection to curb for platform or ramp
- Firm, stable surface
 - No gaps or changes greater than ½ inch
- Needs to meet standard restaurant accessibility requirements




SF Shared Spaces Manual



Fire

- 5' space around fire hydrant
- Canopies, roofs, and heaters subject to Fire
 Department approval





Maintenance

- 3 stream waste bins (trash, recycling, and compost)
- Must keep parklet, curb, and gutter clear and clean
- Must provide access to utilities (modular design recommended)
- Installation subject to removal for maintenance work
- Movable furniture shall be secured when not in use



Fees and Public Access

Application Fee	Annual Fee
\$222 encroachment	\$750/vehicle space

- Fees waived for FY 22/23
- Reduction in annual fee proportional to area provided for general public either for public seating or bus stop amenities



Insurance, Signage, Acceptable Use

 Applicant must add City of Albany as an additional insured, with a minimum coverage of \$1 million per occurrence and \$2 million general aggregate.

Signage is prohibited on parklet structures.

 Reference regulations and corresponding agencies related to outdoor noise, alcohol sales, health, smoking and public nuisance.

Removal

- Applicant must remove
 - if not in use for more than two weeks (unless prior arrangement with City)
 - For city or utility maintenance work
 - Within 15 days from termination of permit or business closing (exceptions can be made by prior arrangement with City)
 - If not properly maintained, is not meeting permit requirements, interferes with public use of the right-of-way, or interferes with maintenance or improvement project
- Permits proposed to be for a 3-year period, applicants must reapply after 3 years, subject to continuation of the parklet program.

Funding Support

 Staff is proposing costs associated with the platform be eligible for reimbursement up to \$15,000 per installation to help businesses in meeting the accessibility and safety requirements in the proposed guidelines while funding is available



Timeline

 Propose setting March 31, 2023 as the date at which existing temporary parklet permits will expire



Enforcement

Enforcement mechanism is termination of permit

 Council may wish to provide guidance on the appropriate timing and intensity of enforcement, including when termination of a permit would be appropriate

 Adjustments to existing parklet and sidewalk installations that are affecting pedestrian visibility at crosswalks or restricting sidewalk widths or heigh clearance.



Recommendation

That the Council:

- Adopt a resolution establishing parklet program guidelines
- Incorporate the annual fee for parklets into a future fee schedule amendment
- Set March 31, 2023 as the date at which existing temporary parklet permits will expire
- Direct staff on enforcement mechanisms

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
